From the Chair

Well we are nearing the end of August and it's been a very busy year with the majority of shows running, only a couple have dropped off the radar due to lack of funds post covid, hopefully they will return in time.

I had the honour of judging Coloured Ryelands at Pembrokeshire County Show in August, this was the first time that coloured Ryeland classes had been arranged and the support from breeders around the area was brilliant. I hope to venture there as an exhibitor next year.

It has been wonderful to see the show results being posted on Facebook and seeing excellent numbers when I have been attending various shows around the country. Special thanks to all those exhibitors and their families for making the commitment to promote and show their livestock in challenging weather on occasion this year. If you were lucky enough to win rosettes then please do forward your results and pictures to the relevant email addresses as shown below so that the show supplements can be produced in the autumn/winter.

There are two lamb shows being held this year, one by the north Wales and Mercia regional committee at Staffordshire County Show ground in November and one held in conjunction with Kington show jointly organised by the Hereford and marches committee and the mid, south and west Wales committees which will be taking place in September. These shows cater for lambs born over a wide range of

months, and can either be trimmed or left au naturale... it's a lovely opportunity to show for the first time if you are a new member and for you not to have to worry about when they were born or the need to trim....

Tupping season is on the horizon and this weekend saw the REBS Show and Sale held in Ludlow. online bidding was available and this was used by members across the UK and in Ireland. Many travelled the length and breadth of the UK to either bring stock for sale or to purchase to develop and improve their flocks for the coming year. The quality of stock presented was fantastic, there were a number of rejects and the issues raised ranged from short tails, incorrect tags and teeth. In the Ryelands the top price went to a Ram Lamb from the Hawthorns Flock (Alison Robinson) which sold for 1,800 to the Winllan flock. In the Coloured Ryelands the top price went to a ewe lamb bred by the Moss Rose flock and which was sold for 1,500g to Rachael Dilworth's Otis flock



Fleece & Yarn Committee

This summer newsletter comes after sheep have been sheared. Some of us have started processing our fleeces, others put them in a sack and sent them to the BWMB, some will sell them pri-



To this end, this report contains an extract from Jack Smellie of Celebrating Wool and Fibre UK about how they prepare their fleeces for spinning and weaving. They make some lovely rugs!

It was such a shame that Tenbury Show was wet. It meant that there were far fewer members of the non sheep keeping public visiting our tent, although it was an attraction to get out of the downpours. Lin took her peg loom, and Judith her spinning wheel and spent a lot of time talking to people about how wonderful wool is, explaining how spinning works and generally talking things woolly, supported by the display of a wide variety of crafts – all Ryeland of course!

It was also pleasing that there was an increase in Fleece Competition entries this year. Congratulations to Justine Williams for getting the first prize in the Ryeland Fleece; to Joanne Fisher who took first and second, and Thomas Nash with third in the Coloured Ryeland Fleece. Thank you as well to Dave Duggan for Judging.

So next year – before you sling your fleeces into that wool bag, just pick out a couple of the ones you like best and put them to one side to show – both at Stafford and Tenbury.

If you only have a few sheep, and think it is not worth the fuel taking your fleeces to the nearest pick up point for the Wool Board, you are able to sell them privately. A

very good place to do this is a website called 'The Fleece Shop'. (https://www.thefleeceshop.co.uk/) It is easy to list and it is a site that is frequented by spinners and weavers looking for British good quality wool. As the Ryeland was bred for the quality of its fleece, we should be getting it out there to those spinners!

The next Fleece and Yarn event will be the Bakewell Wool Gathering on 14th and 15th October. If you are in the area and fancy spending a few hours with us on the stand, then please email Judith on <u>judithann1366@hotmail.co.uk</u>. It is a cheeky way to get into the show for free, and it is always full of inspiring ideas and creative crafters.

Sadly (very sadly as far as the rest of us in the F&Y group are concerned) Lin has decided not to carry on in her role leading us. She has done an amazing job, often not appreciated by the wider Ryeland community, her drive and enthusiasm and ability to organise will be very much missed, although we hope that her physical presence will still be there at events such as Wonderwool Wales and Tenbury Show.

This means that we are a dwindling group, much in need of some fresh input. If you do stuff with your wool (even just selling it to crafters, then get in touch (judithann1366@hotmail.co.uk). There is not a big demand on time, and it is always good to have fresh ideas and creativity.

And if you fancy having a go with your own – this is one approach you could take:

Washing and removing VM (vegetable matter)

We don't heavily skirt our fleeces for rug making as we like to use as much of the fleece as we can and the thick, chunky yarn we make can cope with most types of wool. We do remove poo-ey bits and obvious VM, and if some sections of the fibre has loads of VM in it, we may throw it completely.

We pretty much always cold-water wash unless we feel there is a LOT of lanolin or really dirty tips/locks. We have old cow lick buckets that are big enough for most fleeces (2-3kgs) which we fill with water, a good dollop of Ecover wool wash and Indian Soap nuts. This gets left for around 24 hours during which time we do a few gentle agitations (just when we happen to be passing). We will also carry on picking out VM at this stage too.

Next we rinse - we decamp the wool into an old bread basket so that the mucky water drains away before squeezing out any left and then popping back into the buckets and refilling with clean water. We usually only need to rinse a couple of times with Ecover wool conditioner being added on the last rinse. As we rinse, we pull the fibre apart and keep removing bits of VM.

The wool is now turned back out onto our skirting table - a meshed frame through which water, muck and small bits of unusable wool will fall through. From here it is once again pulled apart a bit, checked for VM and then put onto laundry bags all ready for a spin in our White Knight spin dryer.

After spinning, the wool is now virtually dry and is almost ready to go into our herb drying racks and, on good weather days, be hung outside. This next stage is the most timely because before we put the wool in the racks we tease it apart, handful by handful so it becomes a 'cloud' of wool (similar to putting it through a picker). There are two reasons we do this: firstly it helps it dry quicker and secondly because it also helps to expose and dislodge yet more VM that has so far evaded detection. As the wool then dries, because it is so fluffed up, yet more bits of VM will fall out! In addition, when we come to spin the wool, it is nicely fluffed up and doesn't require much more prep.

Once dry, we transfer the wool to paper sacks and store until we are ready to spin.

We should say: there will still be VM in the wool even at this stage. BUT as we spin and weave, yet more gets exposed and either falls out or can be picked out!! We always say that a bit of VM left in our rugs shows they are the genuine article.

From the Vet

Vaccine Shortages and Preventative Measures Against Orf

Orf (Contagious Pustular Dermatitis – CPD) is a contagious pox-virus in sheep and lambs that causes crusty skin scabs, usually around the nose and mouth. This year the condition has been prevalent. In the summer Orf often occurs when sheep graze upon rougher pastures (e.g. thistles and gorse), which cause scratches and abrasions to the sheep's lips. This allows circulating virus to enter the skin. Although it is very contagious, Orf is usually more of a nuisance than of grave concern in healthy adult sheep. The condition is normally self-resolving unless skin lesions are made worse by secondary bacterial infections. Orf is more of a concern if it occurs at lambing time. The stress of housing and lambing may be a trigger for virus shedding/spread at this time. The virus can also survive inside buildings from the previous lambing season. Lesions in young lambs are often very painful and will reduce the desire to feed. Lambs who have suffered infection are reported to be on average 2.2kg lighter at weaning. There is also up to an 83% chance that infected lambs will transfer lesions to their mother's udder, increasing the risk of mastitis. Orf is a zoonosis, so lesions can spread to humans.

There is currently a nationwide shortage of vaccines for protection against Orf. For many years 'Scabivax Forte' has been licenced vaccine in the UK. This vaccine has recently been rebranded and is now called 'Scabiguard'. A statement from the National Sheep Association (NSA) on 28th July called on vaccine manufacturers and the government for action, expressing concern for animal health and welfare if vaccine supply continues to be disrupted. The plea extends to the difficulty in obtaining vaccines against Clostridial diseases, Pasteurella, toxoplasmosis, enzootic abortion, foot rot and Orf.

Steps to help prevention:

- Quarantine and carefully examine the mouth, nose, and lips of all newly purchased sheep before mixing them with your flock. Scabs may initially be subtle and often start in the very corners of the mouth. The incubation period is short (3 -7days) so active infection should quickly become apparent. Unfortunately, even with the absence of lesions, some sheep will carry the virus in their system and can become infectious to others at times of stress.
- Top/strim or spray thistles on your pastures to help prevent skin scratches.
- Take steps to prevent nose-to-nose contact with neighbouring flocks. For example, double fencing farm boundaries.
- Thoroughly disinfect lambing sheds, especially if you have had cases of Orf in
 previous years. This includes equipment such as feed troughs, hurdles, and hay
 racks. The virus can survive for more than 12 months (some sources claim 'for
 multiple years') inside buildings, and up to 6 weeks in scabs on the pasture. The
 Orf virus is susceptible to most disinfectants, but the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE) recommends solutions containing Hypochlorite.
- When available, vaccination tends to be the most robust protective measure against Orf, providing immunity for over 12 months. Vaccination should not be undertaken in flocks that have never had any cases of Orf. Scabiguard can be administered to ewes (in attempt to suppress circulating virus at lambing time) and/or lambs from 1 day old. Immunity is not passed from ewes to their lambs. Scabiguard is a live vaccine that is administered by scratching the ewe or lamb's skin with an applicator. A small scab will form at the vaccine site. Ewes should be vaccinated at least 7 weeks prior to housing/lambing to prevent scabs from contaminating the lambing environment. Correct vaccine protocol should be followed as per the product datasheet. Wear gloves when handling the vaccine, it can cause Orf in humans.

If there continues to be a shortage of Scabiguard, high risk flocks may consider using an injectable Orf vaccine licenced in Europe, but not in the UK: 'Ecthybel'. Vets may be able to obtain this via special import licence. I cannot vouch for the efficacy or safety data of this vaccine (to be discussed with your vet) but studies so far look to be encouraging. The manufacturers claim that vaccinating pregnant ewes 3-4 weeks prior to lambing will also provide their newborn lambs with some initial immunity.

Steps in the face of an outbreak:

- Isolate any sheep or lambs with scabs (plus its dam if un-weaned) from the rest of the flock immediately.
- Keep lambing sheds clean and dry. Regularly top up bedding to help reduce the risk of sheep coming into contact with infectious scabs.
- Where possible, avoid situations that encourage sheep to make close nose-tonose contact with each other, for example at feeding troughs and crowded hay racks. Regularly disinfect feeding equipment.
- Young lambs may become too painful to drink and may require milk supplementation until scabs heal. Sterilise all bottles and tubing equipment thoroughly between use.
- Regularly check the udder of ewes with infected lambs. Lesions could lead to
 mastitis, requiring prompt medical treatment. Ewes may not allow lambs to
 drink if the udder is painful.
- Pain relief should be administered for anything more than very mild cases.

Lesions are normally self-curing, although full resolution can take up to 28 days. Severe cases may be exacerbated by opportunistic secondary bacterial infections. These cases will require topical antibiotic spray and possibly injectable antibiotic treatment.

There are always various anecdotal suggestions of ointments/sprays/oils (and more unusual substances) that some claim will cure Orf in the blink of an eye! It is likely that the self-resolving nature of this virus is why all manner of potions have been perceived to be curative. Salt licks and Orf mineral buckets that are designed to dry up skin scabs are likely to be beneficial, provided they do not act as a source of contamination. Sprays and solutions (such as dilute iodine or Alu-spray) with drying and antibacterial action may help to prevent secondary bacterial infection.

In the face of an outbreak some sources advocate vaccinating all in-contact stock (if vaccine is obtainable). However, this may be of limited gain because Scabiguard takes 4-8 weeks to provide active immunity after vaccination.

News from Ryecroft - How fast has this year gone?

The showing season has almost come to an end and I can't believe tupping time is upon us once again. I think it's one of my favourite times of the year! The excitement of choosing tups and ewe combinations; the anticipation of what they will produce, I just love it!! Whilst writing this I am still making final decisions on which ewes will go with which tup. Our teaser is being prepared to go in first to do his job at getting all the girls to cycle with the hopes that lambing will be fast and furious and over in 17days. Wouldn't that be lovely? Many of you will have already had the tups in and indeed out already, but we aim to lamb mid-February onwards in the hopes that the weather is kinder and the ewes and lambs won't have to wait as long for fresh grass.

Our grazing rotation has been carefully planned for autumn and into the beginning of winter but we have to adapt to the conditions so my spreadsheet may very well end up on the fire! We have, however, chosen our lamb turnout field so that we can save it as best we can. We rotate which field the lambs get turned out on each year to try and prevent to build up of cocci and other parasites that can affect the newborns until they build up resistance. This is something I've learned to do with the help of my vets whom I use a lot in the health care plan for my flock. And this year it's even easier to get help from your vets as the government have launched the Animal Health and Welfare pathway. Have you heard of it? Unfortunately at the moment it is only available if you are in receipt of BPS but it's a grant you can get from the government to go towards your vet bills. The aim is to lower your parasitic burden through faecal egg counts, however once you qualify you can use it for anything that will help the health of your flock; from blood tests to check the health of your ewes pre lambing, through to consultation costs with your vet. If you need information www.apply-for-an-annual-health-and-welfaremore go to review.defra.gov.uk/apply/guidance-for-farmers or speak to your vet who will be happy to help.

This year's crop of lambs are starting to come through our butchery now, much to the delight of our customers who have been eagerly awaiting their lamb boxes, and of course it means this year's payday has finally arrived. We have, of course, select-



ed our replacements to join our breeding ewes next year, and we have a selection of lambs that we will take through the winter to become hogget next spring.

Our fields have done a wonderful job this year producing delicious food for the flock and the herbal ley has protected the soil from erosion and poaching in all this rain. The fields I overseeded back in June are coming on nicely and I will be using them in the autumn rotation to

see how they fare. We've also been busy fencing in preparation for more hedgerows and hedgerow trees to be planted this winter (best get some new wellies for that, my current ones have sprung a leak); a job we carried out several years ago and one that I am not really looking forward to but it will be so worth it once completed.

Last but not least, our woodland is thriving thanks to the conservation work done by our pigs and the wildlife it brings to the farm is ever increasing. We are now up to three species of owl and last night I had the shock of my life coming face to face with a deer!!! I was not expecting that and despite my best efforts I couldn't get my phone out fast enough!!





Anyhow, back to the pedigree certificates and grazing spreadsheets I go. I hope tupping time goes well for everyone and you get your wishes for your lambing schedule.

Strong Trade and a New Coloured Ryeland Record at the RFBS 2023 Sale

A record entry of 376 sheep at the 2023 Ryeland Flock Book Society Main Sale at Ludlow Livestock Market drew a good crowd of potential buyers and good averages.

A new Coloured Ryeland record for a Coloured Ryeland Female was set when the female champion went through the ring. The ewe lamb, bred by M Varmen, Macclesfield, was placed a champion by the judge L Howell. Moss Rose Dora, a home bred lamb, sired by Moss Rose Bingo, was sold for 1500gns to the Otis flock of R Dilworth, Bradford. The reserve champion, a shearling ewe from the Landriggs flock of E & J Henderson, Milnathort, Kinross, sold for 600gns to M Varmen. Top priced shearling ewe from the Scoulton flock of J Stone, Melsop, was also the first prize winner. Sired by Mansel Zaki, she sold for 750gns to D Evans, Pontarddulais.

The Coloured Ryeland males were judge by S Hipps, Bishop Thornton, and the chosen champion was Allerdale Cassanova, a shearling ram from A & E Robinson, Wigton. Sired by Riverside Ybba and out of a Hawthorns ewe, he sold for 600gns to J Stone. The top price for the day was achieved by the reserve champion, ram lamb Churchstoke Dafydd. Bred by R Whitticase, Churchstoke, he sold

for 1000gns and will join the Roman Castle flock of O Reade, Thirsk. Also joining Mr Reade's flock will be the second highest priced ram lamb, Snelson Duke Ellington. Bred by M Varmen and sired by Snelson Vineapola, he was knocked down for

Coloured Ryeland Breeder Profile

Montgomery Flock Sue & Andy McVicar

Our flock was established about 20 years ago, when we purchased our first Coloured Ryeland Ewe Lambs for £40 each, from our dear friend the late Jo Walsh (Aytoe Flock) based in Bettws, Newtown, Powys. It was never our intention to breed from them they were just lawn mowers to keep the grass down for our horses at that time.

It was about 12 months later that we met Marian Thornett the secretary of the Coloured Ryeland Group, from whom we purchased our first ram. At this time there were no classes for Coloured Ryelands anywhere in the country, so we decided to show two shearling ewes in full fleece in the any other breed class at the Spring Festival at Builth Wells. We were placed 2nd and 5rd in the class and from then on we were hooked! It was at this show that we first met Caz and Ef Bateman who eventually purchased their first Coloured Ryelands from us.

It took some years for us to get our own classes for the Coloured Ryelands having to show in Any Other Breed to prove to the shows that we had sufficient numbers to be able to have our own specific classes. The first show was Burwarton and over the years we were able to establish shows at Tenbury Wells, Llyswen, Sennybridge, Kington, Spring Festival Builth Wells and


eventually The Royal Welsh. These shows resulted in the Bob Webb points trophy.

We have two flocks one being Montgomery Coloured Ryelands and the other Blackwell Ryelands. We have been fortunate to have won many championships over the years including male champion and overall re-
